G.R.A.P.E.S. (Geography, Religion, Art, Politics, Economics, Social Structure)

Geography is the study of the earth and its features. It also includes where different types of life are located on the earth, including human life.

Features = Include things like hills, mountains, streams, oceans, deserts, canyons, etc.

Types of life = Could include herds of deer, forests (trees), grassland, schools of fish, groups of humans, etc.

G.R.A.P.E.S. (Geography, Religion, Art, Politics, Economics, Social Structure)

Religion is a set of spiritual beliefs, values, and practices.

Religion can include:

- A set of beliefs about the cause, nature, and purpose of the universe.
- Belief in and worship of a supernatural power or powers regarded as creator and ruler of the universe .
- An organization of people based around any of these ideas.

G.R.A.P.E.S. (Geography, Religion, Art, Politics, Economics, Social Structure)

Art is a wide range of human activities and artifacts that stimulate the senses. During the Romantic Period, art meant that the mind was linked to religion and science.

Art can include:

- Music, literature, visual arts, painting, etc.
- Leo Tolstoy identified art as a use of indirect means to communicate from one person to another
- A human activity that stimulates the senses.

G.R.A.P.E.S. (Geography, Religion, Art, Politics, Economics, Social Structure)

Politics is the study of government or the control and organization of large groups of people.

Politics usually refers to how a city, a state, or a country is governed and their relationship with other cities, states, and countries.

G.R.A.P.E.S. (Geography, Religion, Art, Politics, Economics, Social Structure)

Economics is the study of the production, distribution, and consumption of material goods or services.

Production = How things are made.

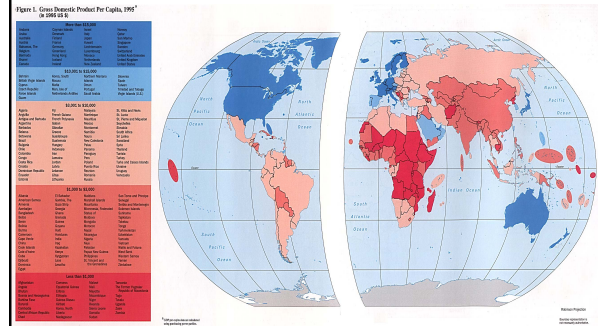
Distribution = How things get from where they are made to where they are used.

Consumption = What things are used by people and how they are used.

Material Goods = Physical things that people use, like cars, bikes, houses, tools, food, or anything you would buy at the store.

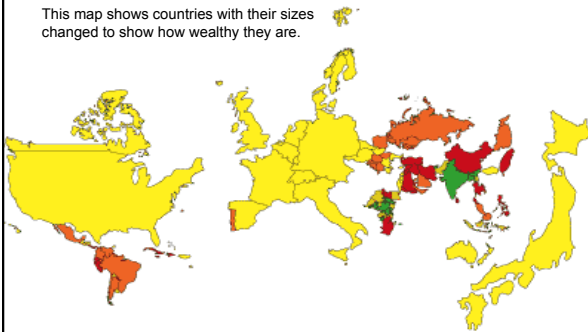
Services = Things that people do for other people, like cutting their hair, serving their food, or fixing their car.

Economic Map



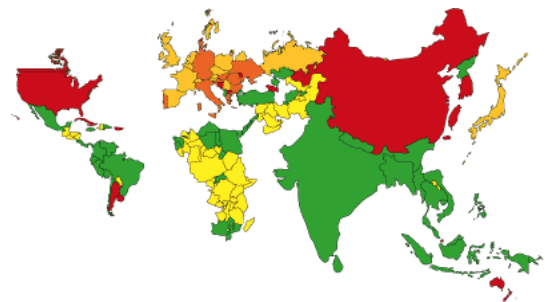
Economic Map

G.R.A.P.E.S. (Geography, Religion, Art, Politics, Economics, Social Structure)

Social Structures include groups of people interacting with each other on a personal level such as families or groups of friends.

- They include common social activities that people do with each other when they are not working.
- Examples are marriages, families, groups of friends, clubs, etc.
